

From the Desk of Fr. Larry...

My sisters and brothers, the message of today's readings comes from John the Baptist, cousin of Jesus and wild man in the desert. John attracts people from everywhere because he, unlike other prophets, claims to be THE prophet announcing that the long-awaited Messiah, the Messiah foretold by all the ancient prophets, will soon be presenting himself to God's chosen people. Keep in mind that, in the eyes of God, to be Chosen is to not be superior to others, but to have the unique responsibility for caring for all others. To prepare for the Messiah, John calls everyone to repent from their sins and selfishness and turn toward God with their whole being. In doing so, they are then ready to take a different route, a road that reflects a life lived in love for others.

This is no small ask of any of us, is it? Turn away from our selfishness and need for status, control and power over others, instead channeling our gifts fully in service to God and others in need of our unique gifts?

I like to sum this up in one simple phrase: "Our lives were not created to be our own!" Let me say it again: "Our lives were not created to be our own!" The Season of Advent, like John the Baptist to the people of his time, beckons us into the wilderness of silence and reflection, self-examination and letting go of old destructive and unproductive ways, emerging refreshed and ready to reengage life in new ways. The image of the wilderness can be scary for us. It is traveling to a place – or a state of mind – where we must depend on nature to survive. In our case, both Mother Nature and Divine Nature.

John the Baptist called people into the wilderness because he knew it would force them to look around, to look down at the earth and to look up at the sky, to take in all of god's creation around them. In the wilderness we realize how small we really are, especially when we ponder the night skies and the immensity of our universe. But meeting God in the wilderness invites us to realize how precious our lives are, how special each and every human being and every living thing is simply because it is all Gift from God. Without the familiar comforts of home, those who came to John the Baptist had to open all their physical, emotional and spiritual senses to the world around them. Some came because they were curious. Most came because they were looking for, longing for something more in life. Every year Advent God calls us to immerse ourselves more deeply into this holy mystery and, in the process, be surprised where God leads us if we are willing to follow Him wholeheartedly. I am reminded of a time when my family decided to go to a local peach orchard and pick fresh peaches. On arriving at the orchard, an old fellow who was tending the place said, 'If you want the best fruit, go deeper into the orchard; the peaches on the fringes are picked over, but deeper in, you'll find the best fruit.' The old man watched us as we made our way into the orchard and whenever we decided to stop to pick the fruit, he yelled at us 'Go deeper.' Eventually we reached a point where the old man smiled and said, "There!" And he was right. the finest, plumpest peaches were untouched and waiting for us." Have you gone deep enough into your spiritual journey? Now is the time. John the Baptist – and Jesus – beckons you and me. **Gentle Peace! Fr. Larry**

The Apparition of the Virgin of Guadalupe

On December 9, 1531, only a decade after Spanish troops had conquered and supplanted the Aztec empire, a newly converted native Nahua man, Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin, was walking near a hill known as Tepeyac, on the outskirts of



Mexico City. He was on his way to catechism classes when he heard beautiful sounds from atop the hill. Following the sound, he came upon a vision of a beautiful woman floating in the air. She told him, in Nahuatl, that she was the Mother of the true God, and that he should tell the bishop that she wanted a church built there in her honor. Juan Diego went to the bishop to do so, but was not granted an audience, so he returned to Tepeyac. She appeared again and asked him to return to the bishop. The bishop received him, but doubted the claims and asked for a sign. Juan Diego returned to Tepeyac, and the lady promised to send a sign the next day. Juan Diego was not actually able to return that day because his uncle fell gravely sick, but on December 12, he met her again. She reassured him and told him not to fear, describing herself as his mother, one who would care for him. She assured him that his uncle was cured, and told him to go to the hilltop and gather the flowers growing there to bring to the bishop. Though it was December, he found roses and other flowers growing, and bundled the flowers in his tilma, or cloak, carrying them back to Bishop Zumárraga. When he unfurled the tilma, the image of the Virgin the same image venerated above the altar at the basilica today—appeared to the bishop. When Juan Diego returned to his uncle, he learned that the Virgin had also appeared to the uncle, and had called herself by the name Guadalupe. According to tradition, a small chapel was built there almost immediately, and the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe was placed there.
